OREF-funded Study Led to Lifesaving Procedures in Total Hip Replacement

Throughout its history, OREF-funded research has enhanced clinical care, which leads to improved health, increased activity, and a better quality of life for patients. The following research topics are just some examples of the advancements in patient care that OREF funding has helped to provide.



James H. Herndon, M.D., 1970 Research Grant recipient Topic: Showed that fat embolism occurred

with fractures, and to some extent with every total hip replacement, which led to new precautions to avoid patient fatality.

Results: Initially, high dose steroids given to fracture patients with severe adult respiratory distress syndrome were shown to save otherwise terminal patients. Eventually, the study led to other procedures to combat this problem, including earlier detection for fracture patients. It also led to femur venting during insertion of the cement and femoral component and today's accepted treatment of plugging the femur below the prosthesis for hip replacement patients. This has greatly minimized the problem of fat embolism after total hip replacement. An OREF-funded study by Dr. James Herndon led to development of procedures that greatly reduced fatalities from the fat embolism syndrome by preventing fat and bone marrow emboli from entering the lungs and causing cardiovascular system collapse.

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A Charitable Lead Trust Offers Good News for Bad Markets

s it turns out, there is a way to take control of a bad-market situation And use it to your advantage. Recent declines in equity portfolio values may present some excellent opportunities for tactical estate and gift planning.

Consider the charitable lead trust (CLT). A donor transfers cash or assets, which are appreciating in value, into a trust with the intention of supporting a charitable organization, such as OREF, and then returning the assets to the family. It's a tool that helps preserve family wealth and control social capital.

The lead trust works well in a low-interest environment because the value of the remainder interest to heirs for gift tax purposes is decreased, allowing you to pass more to them for the same cost. The donor has a choice about using either a fixed dollar contribution (CLAT) or a fixed percentage contribution (CLUT) to meet the requirements for a qualified lead trust.

Is there any risk to creating a charitable lead annuity trust? If the CLT investments earn less than the government's charitable midterm federal rate (the interest rate used by the IRS to value the remainder interest in a gift), then the trust will produce a remainder significantly less than what was originally contributed. If the trust manager takes a long-term view and maintains a tax efficiently managed portfolio, though, the subsequent growth passes tax free to heirs.

Currently, with the government's low interest rate used in calculating the gift value and the stock market decline, a charitable lead annuity trust is an excellent planning tool. Creative Ways to Contribute to OREF

or the past 10 years, Joseph C. McCarthy, M.D. has been an active supporter of OREF, and within the last five years, he found



a creative way to contribute to OREF's goal of funding research that ultimately enhances patient care.

"I realized that I had the opportunity to join the Shands Circle and address OREF's need to fund research today by directing proceeds from a consulting arrangement with a device company to OREF," explained Dr. McCarthy. "This maneuver made sense for tax purposes, but more importantly, it helped OREF support young researchers whose efforts over time will improve the practice of our specialty. I'd encourage other surgeons to consider doing something similar."

Through the designation of residuals from the consulting arrangement, Dr. McCarthy joined OREF's highest-level recognition society, the Shands Circle, in 2000. To become a Shands member, contributors must make a minimum \$20,000 cash or stock commitment over a maximum of five years, or a minimum of \$50,000 in deferred giving arrangements.

Dr. McCarthy gave \$20,000 from his consulting arrangement in 2000 to become a Shands member. Even though that Shands commitment has now been fulfilled, he has continued to assign some of his residuals to OREF, but now he supports the Annual Campaign to fund current research. In 2004, he contributed \$5,000

Recently, **Diogo Moreira-Rato**, U.S. President, DePuy Orthopaedics, Trauma & Extremities, spent a few minutes with *Impact* to explain what he thinks the future holds for orthopaedics and why DePuy is committed to supporting OREF.

Impact: What role do you think OREF plays for orthopaedic surgeons and patients?

OREF-funded Research Led to Improvements to Rotator Cuff and Knee Surgeries Among Many Other Practical Applications (continued from page 1)

Marshall R. Urist, M.D.,

1963 & 1967 Research Grant recipient **Topic:** Studied the calcium binding capacity of proteins in the tendon and the effects of irradiation of bone matrix upon bone induction by bone implants **Results:** Developed BMP.

Patient Care Application of Results: Stimulation of bone growth, allowing for better fusions and total joint replacements.



Evan Flatow, M.D., 1989 Career Development Award recipient Topic: Studied the mechanics and clinical outcomes of rotator

cuff repair. Resulting data was used to prospectively compare arthroscopic and open repair.

Results: Found that although many tendons did not heal, those that did heal had better strength and function, which encouraged others to develop improved repair methods.

Patient Care Application of Results: Better repair methods for rotator cuff injuries to possibly strengthen the tendon and prevent further injury.



Steven P. Arnoczky, D.V.M., 1984 Research Grant recipient Topic: Investigated the feasibility of using

cadaver knee joint cartilage — menisci — to replace severely damaged menisci. Results: Showed that frozen cadaver menisci could be transplanted and naturally incorporated into the knee joint, which has become a common surgical procedure, enhancing the quality of life for patients over the last 20 years. Patient Care Application of Results: Replacement of bad knee joint cartilage with good cartilage, lessening pain and increasing mobility.



Joseph M. Lane, M.D. 1975 & 1978 Research Grant recipient Topic: Investigated the events that occur during fracture healing.

Results: Encouraged further studies to find ways to enhance fracture healing, including growth factors and systemic drugs. This in turn resulted in the critical development of BMPs and discovery of collagraft, a synthetic bone graft substitute.

Patient Care Application of Results: Fusions and prosthetic joints that function better over time.

OREF began 2005 by kicking off its 50th Anniversary Capital Campaign. Introduced at the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons' (AAOS) annual meeting in Washington, D.C., this campaign set an ambitious yet attainable goal of raising \$100 million in total

giving to add significantly to the OREF endowment.
